£2m Boost for Croston

On 30 Nov 2012 the Treasury announced that an extra £120M was to be invested in speeding up the delivery of flood defence schemes. Half of this money was for locations worthy of accelerated delivery of protection schemes, following the 2012 floods and the fantastic news for Croston is that the Environment Agency has announced that initial funding of £1.5m has been earmarked towards an estimated total cost of £2.1m to construct defences that will reduce the risk of flooding to over 450 local homes and businesses.

Possible solutions to the problems include upstream flood storage, raised defences, a flow diversion into the Croston Moss area, upstream flow diversion from the River Yarrow to the River Douglas and combinations of these. The preferred solution will be determined following consultation with partner organisations and the local community.

The news was welcomed by Derek Antrobus, chair of the North West Regional Flood and Coastal Committee, who approved the indicative programme of funding in their January meeting.

He said: "Our success in securing this funding is down to the excellent co-operation in the North West between the Environment Agency and local authorities. No matter where in the region, no matter what their politics, local councils have worked with the Environment Agency to make sure we get the best deal for communities at risk in the North West."

But he warned: "Despite our investment there will always be properties at risk and there is always a risk that major flood events will overtop defences. It is still really important for people to sign up to flood warnings and take action to prepare for flooding."

A number of people have been working towards securing the funding on behalf of the village including Lancashire County Councillors and Officers. County Councillor Albert Atkinson, Lancashire County Council's representative on the Environment Agency's North West Regional Flood and Coastal Committee has worked with local representative and Parish Councillor Keith Iddon to push this scheme to develop a lasting solution for the village forward. County Councillor Atkinson said "Following last summer's floods we have worked very closely with our partners, including the Environment Agency, to look at solutions to the village's flooding problems. We've already put some measures into place, including improving drainage, but this £1.5m funding will enable us to protect more than 400 local homes and businesses".

The Parish Council would like to thank everyone involved in achieving the funding for their efforts.

Chairman's Report

I would like to begin by expressing my thanks to Robert Baker who resigned from the Parish Council in February. We send our best wishes to Robert and his wife.

The news that £2.1 million has been secured to invest in flood defences in Croston (see front page) has been welcomed by everyone who has been working to raise the issue. We look forward to hearing how the funding will be spent.

I am also pleased that the Parish Council has been able to devise a budget for the coming year which meet its needs but only requires a very small increase in Council tax to householders.

The plans for the Recreation Ground have been approved by the Parish Council and I would like to thank the volunteers of the Friends of Croston Recreation Ground for their work to date. The plans will now be costed and the group will begin the massive task of securing the necessary funding to make the plans a reality.

Council Tax 2013-14

At the January meeting the Council approved a reduction in the Parish Precept of £936 (approx 4.5%) for 2013-14, despite introducing a completely new budget of £2000 introduced to assist with flooding issues and an additional £2500 towards the Recreation Ground improvement project.

Ordinarily, this would have resulted in a similar percentage reduction in the parish part of residents' council tax however, due to a 7% reduction in the Council Tax Base (the figure on which the parish precept is worked) as a result of revisions to the Council Tax Benefit Scheme, this will result in an increase of 52p per annum for the average Band D council tax payer. This would have been more but for Chorley Council passing on a small portion of its increase in income from the new council tax support grant provided by Central Government.

From the Precept the Council employs our Village Lengthsman, who picks litter from the major routes through the village, ongoing maintenance of the Recreation Ground and Play Area and the Village Green, mowing of the Recreation Field and the Village Green and grass verges throughout the village. The Council also provides the Christmas tree and lights on the Village Green, planting of the tubs and beds around the village, wayside seats and some litter bins, the Speed Indicator Device, emptying of dog waste bins and the requisite insurance cover.

Thank You

The 2012 Poppy Appeal in Croston raised just over £2000, an increase of over £300 on the 2011 figure.

Community Defibrillator

Every year around 30000 people suffer cardiac arrest outside of hospital every year and chances of survival decrease by 14% for each minute treatment is delayed.

A sponsored Pub Quiz, arranged by Parish Councillor Stephen Parkinson and friend Steven Swift, raised over £850 towards a public access Automated External Defibrillator (AED). There were over 6

teams with over 90 participants in the quiz who all had a brilliant evening. The winning team were from The Black Horse and the trophy which was kindly donated by Stonewater Wealth Management of Tarleton, was presented to team captain Lesley Carlton by Roger Smith of Wymott Community

First Responders. An additional donation from the Parish Council to cover the balance of the cost and installation should see the

defibrillator installed in the village

centre very soon.

Now comes the opportunity for residents to learn basic life support skills thanks to the British Heart Foundation's (BHF) HeartStart programme and North West Ambulance Service's Wymott Community First Responders (CFRs).

The Heartstart programme is a free initiative which teaches people what to do in life threatening emergencies. Training will be delivered by Wymott CFRs, volunteers who live and work in the local community.

Lower Yarrow Flood Action Group

Beginning back in 2010 a series of meetings, initially set up by Laura Travers of the Environment Agency and Simon Clark, Head of Environment and Neighbourhoods at Chorley Council, took place to formulate an Emergency Flood Plan. Arising from this, the Emergency Flood Group, coordinated by Parish Councillor, Bruno Paillusson, will take action to help the village cope in a flood situation.

From the original meetings, Parish Councillors Kath Almond and Peter Fenemore and members of the community David Massam and John Twinn organised their own Flood Action Group and, over the next two years, held many meetings with the Environment Agency, United Utilities, Lancashire County Council and Chorley Council. They also looked at Flood Defence Schemes in other areas.

A public meeting in November 2012, attended by around a hundred concerned residents, saw the formalisation of the Lower Yarrow Flood Action Group, with a constitution and committee.

To be awarded the £2.1m funding for a flood defence scheme (see front cover) is fantastic news, and the Group would like to thank everyone involved for the hard work in obtaining the grant for Croston.


